With the move to our new location, ESR has been able to enhance our operations to be more conducive to clients and volunteers. Our new facility has allowed us to host 24 IDA classes, 3 IDA graduations, and 4 events. In addition, we prepared 926 taxes, and taught 6 financial literacy classes. It has opened its doors to 800 clients and families, one new program, and endless love and support.

Through internships we can offer students hands-on experience working with the low-income community that will help them understand the challenges and fulfillment of helping clients move from the most hopeless situations to self-sufficiency. Students are exposed to nearly every aspect of the day-to-day function of a nonprofit community action agency.

Interns can expect to be part of the team, and will do some job shadowing, along with direct client contact. As they rotate through the various departments, activities and tasks may vary from answering phones or entering data to creative activities such as designing brochures or flyers. Interns might also serve as assistants for classroom activities, or even speak at events or information fairs.
